Trustees Report

Woodhill Evangelical Church

Report of the Trustees

Year ended 31 December 2021

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the church for the year ended 31 December 2021.

Status of Charity and Governing Document

Woodhill Evangelical Church ("the church") is established by Trust Deed, adopted on 1 January 2010 and ratified on 8 March 2010. A supplemental trust deed was registered on 16 August 2018 and approved by OSCR on 7 September 2018. The church is a Scottish Charity (No. SC018514).

Charitable Objectives and Aims

The aims and objectives of the church as stated in the Trust Deed are:

- o to advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of Beliefs and Practices
- to relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote and preserve good health by the provision of funds, goods or services of any kind, including through the provision of counselling and support in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Trustees from time to time may think fit; and
- o to advance education in such ways and in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Trustees from time to time may think fit.

Achievements and performance

In relation to activities:

Our focus as a leadership has been to continue to share what we believe is God's Vision for the Church Family at Woodhill as we seek to "Develop a Community Devoted to Jesus" and share the good news of Hs word.

2021 was dominated by the impact of COVID-19, with lockdown and frequent changes to regulation resulting in a very disruptive period. In the early part of the year, church services were entirely on-line and the close fellowship that so characterises our church was missing. Our contacts with the community suffered and our church activities, as well as our external lets, ceased to operate. The Church and café were closed, with both Church and café staff on furlough, though we saw fit to top-up wages to ensure that no-one endured hardship as a result. Set against this, however, the arrival of our new Paster, David Gooding, was a bright light in what was otherwise a dark period, as he and the rest of the leadership sought to find new ways to interact with the members and others associated with the fellowship.

During this period, our COVID Team worked tirelessly to ensure that we followed all government guidance and ensure the safety of everyone. As restrictions began to ease, we restarted church services, initially with a much-reduced capacity, ensuring that all the necessary risk assessment, preparatory work and post-service was completed. The constant changes in guidance were a challenge and we are indebted to the members of the COVID Team for keeping us safe.

The development of our streaming capability developed considerably during 2021, with our technical team learning how best to use this means of communication and applying this learning as restrictions lessened and we were able to move towards more 'normal' services. We continue to develop our capability in this area, recognising that it provides us with a means to include those who are unable to physically attend church for health reasons.

In relation to funding

We continue to plan to meet all our financial commitments with staff, resources and the ongoing costs that are associated with operating a church that is open every day. During the year, giving via Standing Order remained fairly static, but income from offerings at church services declined significantly.

Trustees Report

During 2021, we took the opportunity offered by having funds available as a result of paying off the loan for the building and having no Pastor's salary to pay for a year to undertake a number of building improvements. These included the installation of automatic doors, cavity wall insulation and an extension of the fire alarm in the old part of the building, replacement of the CCTV system and a number of repairs. Due to inclement weather and continuing lockdown, we deferred planned re-painting of the building exterior until 2022.

In relation to changes

Our Treasurer, Douglas Kenney, retired at the end of March 2021 after delivering our financial results. Ronald Copeland took on the role of Treasurer with Douglas continuing to support as part of a formal handover of duties. Brian Miller took on the role of Interim Chair of the Trustees.

In order to best serve the complex needs of financial management of a growing church, we transferred our financial systems to a commercial cloud-based system and improved the surrounding administrative processes. While this initially gave us some teething problems, these have been resolved and our financial reporting and management capabilities have been strengthened as a result. A computerised system for managing Gift Aid claims was also introduced, enabling us to claim on a monthly, rather than quarterly, basis. This has greatly improved our cashflow.

We also introduced a new approach to budgeting towards the end of 2021, which we hope will pay dividends in allowing us to more closely monitor progress throughout each year, starting in 2022. A Staff Handbook and improved processes for Church and café staff was also introduced in readiness for 2022.

Plans for the Future

We are greatly encouraged by the energy and new ideas our new Pastor has brought to the church and are actively working with David and the rest of the leadership to develop God's vision for the church and local community. As a leadership, we will continue to develop spiritual pathways for our Church members and friends, looking at the most effective ways to help people grow spiritually. Part of this will include running courses, such as Alpha and providing opportunities for those who are seeking to know more about the Christian faith.

Our Woman's Pastoral Worker continues to have a positive impact on the spiritual life of the women associated with the church and we will seek to determine how best to apply this in the wider context of pastoral care within the church.

We will continue to build relationships in the local Community through our Hub Cafe, which is open throughout the week, with our local schools (Wester Cleddens Primary School and Bishopbriggs Academy), through the work of The Storehouse and the events we organise for local charities and community groups.

We will continue to have a focus on supporting overseas mission work through regular and ad-hoc funding and visits, led by our Mission Team.

We will also focus on creating an inspiring worship experience through our gifted and growing Worship and Family Services teams, looking at ways we can bring people closer to Jesus in their personal relationship.

Financial review

Principal sources of funding

The charity receives its funding from donations by the members of the church by way of regular offerings and Gift Aid donations.

Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out in pages 6 to 13. The Statement of Financial Activities on page 6 reflects a surplus for the year and net incoming resources (before transfers) of £31,358 (2020 £65,446).

Trustees Report

Reserves

The charity's General Fund - that is unrestricted reserves not designated or tied up in fixed assets - amounted to £93,853 at 31 December 2021 (2020 £65,887). Overall reserves, including the net book value of fixed assets and balances on restricted funds amounted to £2,075,324 (2020 £2,043,966).

It is the policy of the church to maintain unrestricted funds, i.e. funds not committed or invested in fixed assets, at a level which equates to approximately six months unrestricted expenditure. This allows sufficient funds to enable the ongoing work of the church to be maintained. The General Fund at 31 December 2021 amounted to £93,853 (2020 £65,887).

Going Concern

As Trustees we have assessed the state of affairs of the charity as at 31 December 2021. In our opinion there are no significant doubts about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern and no material uncertainties which require to be disclosed.

Structure, Governance and Management

Trustees and Office Bearers

The Elders oversee the spiritual welfare of the church and lead the vision for church growth in accordance with our Statement of Beliefs and Practices. The Trustees oversee the operations and administration of the church as a charity recognised by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. The Office Bearers who served during the year and to the date of this report are detailed in the Church Information on page 1.

Appointment of Trustees

New Trustees are nominated for appointment by the existing Trustees. There is no fixed term for Trusteeship. Prior to their appointment, new Trustees would have served the church for some time in various roles and would be familiar with the church's values, its aims and objectives as well as its day-to-day operations. As part of their induction programme, new Trustees will be required to understand their statutory responsibilities as Trustees of the charity.

Grant Making Policy

The church makes grants from its freewill income to individuals and organisations that are generally known to the Trustees and the church. Such beneficiaries are involved in activities or ministries compatible with the church's objectives.

Trustees' Responsibilities for the financial statements

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare statements of account for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources for that period.

In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and to disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity, and to enable them to ensure that any statements of accounts comply with the requirements of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Accounting Policies

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and under the guidelines laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities and the Financial Reporting Standard 102 section 1A.

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis.

Church Income

All voluntary income is accounted for when received. Income from tax recoveries on Gift Aid and bank interest are accounted for on the accruals basis.

Tangible fixed assets

The original church land and building at 30 Wester Cleddens Road, was professionally valued as at 31 December 1999 on an existing use basis.

Construction work on a new church building commenced in February 2007, and was completed in March 2008. Expenditure on the new building in has been included in the Balance Sheet at cost.

No depreciation is charged on land and buildings.

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of furnishings and equipment over their expected useful lives at the following annual rates:-

Furnishings and equipment - 20% on cost.

Impairment Review

An impairment review has been carried out on the building. The Trustees are of the opinion that the building is worth more than the carrying value in these financial statements, and therefore no write down on the value of the building has been applied.

Statement of Financial Activities

For the purpose of the Statement of Financial Activities, as shown on page 6, funds are defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds comprise donations and other income received for the objects of the church without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds represent unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds comprise income which has been received for the objects of the church and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

Pension Scheme

The church has a defined contribution pension scheme. The cost of the contributions made by the church is charged to the Income and Expenditure Account as incurred.
